in Abuja, when he received a coalition of civil society organisations under the aegis of the West Africa Civil Societies Forum (WACSOFF) in his office.

The Registrar, while reacting to posers raised by the body on the inability of some candidates to either check their results on account of missing telephone lines, said the Board had put up a seamless system for the use of candidates and the general public alike to resolve all issues.

Consequently, he stated that the first and logical step for the candidates to take would be to welcome back the missing SIM since

all transactions with the Board was through the facility of that SIM.

He, however, pointed out that candidates had other channels of communication open to them to access needed information such as their personal e-mail and profile, which are other layers of outreach designed by the Board as support mechanisms.

Prof Oloyede also stated that another redress mechanism available to candidates is the Ticketing platform through which candidates could open a ticket to register their complaints for immediate action. He stated that, going forward, the Board would

launch a platform through which candidates with similar problems would be able to collectively table their issues.

He, therefore, decried a situation whereby candidates would not avail themselves of the plethora of information out there in the news media to effortlessly address their concerns. He also described the various advisories put out by the Board as equally veritable sources of information with respect to registration, examination administration, and result checking, among others.

## NASU ATTENDS EBLTGC MEETING IN OWERRI

The Non-Academic Staff Union of Educational and Associated Institutions (NASU), JAMB Branch, has attended the Examination Bodies and Libraries Trade Group Council (EBLTGC) held in Owerri, Imo State.

The meeting, which was hosted by the WAEC Zonal Office, Owerri, was held between Wednesday, 26th and Thursday, 27th June, 2024.

According to the Chairman, NASU, JAMB Branch, Comrade Andrew Onakpa, the council-in-session discussed issues affecting Examination Bodies as well as the

general welfare of members. He also added that the union discussed the need for government to improve the funding of Examination Bodies to enable them operate at the same level of efficiency as their counterparts in other climes.

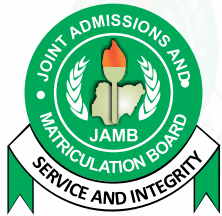
towards proper maintenance and management of material resources of the Board; HST 101: Health and Safety Training, to foster safety consciousness among staff.

## EDUCATION IN THE MEDIA

**PUNCH, MONDAY, JULY 1, 2024: Rivers Varsity Gets NUC Accreditation for 18 New Programmes:-** The Rivers State University, Nkpolu-Orowurukwu, Port Harcourt, has announced that it has received full accreditation from the National Universities Commission (NUC) for all 18 programmes presented. This achievement follows the recent accreditation exercise conducted by the NUC in October/November 2023.

The Vice-Chancellor, Prof. Nlerum Okogbule, said, "This is the second time the university has achieved 100% accreditation success since its inception in 1980, replicating a similar feat achieved last year. This is a rare and unprecedented achievement in the university's history,"

Regarding the necessary facilities for the newly accredited programmes, Prof. Okogbule assured that the university has the required infrastructure in place, including classrooms, staff offices, laboratories, and other essential facilities. He expressed gratitude to Governor Siminalayi Fubara for his support and reiterated the university's commitment to achieving even greater heights.

**PUNCH, TUESDAY, JULY 2, 2024: Reps Probe WAEC Revenue, Expenditures:-** On Tuesday, 2 July 2024, the House of Representatives tasked its Committee on Basic Education with investigating the West African Examination Council's (WAEC) Internally Generated Revenue (IGR) from 2018 to 2023. This decision came after considering a motion presented by Mr Amobi Ogah, representing Isiukwato/Umunneochi Federal Constituency of Abia state.

Mr. Ogah argued that WAEC, as a treasury-funded organization, is subject to the National Assembly's oversight. He cited Section 80(4) of the Nigerian Constitution, which

states that public funds can only be withdrawn in a manner prescribed by the National Assembly. He also noted that examination fees collected by WAEC constitute public funds.

The lawmaker expressed concerns over WAEC's financial transparency, particularly regarding a N5 billion credit facility obtained from First Bank Plc in 2022, which was repaid within the same year without clear disclosure of its purpose. He invoked the National Assembly's power under Section 89(1)(c) of the Constitution to summon persons and documents to investigate WAEC's IGR, financial statements, and debt collection from state governments.

The House resolved to scrutinize WAEC's IGR and subject its 2024 budget to appropriation and approval, ensuring accountability and prudent stewardship of public funds.

**LEADERSHIP, WEDNESDAY, JULY 3, 2024: NELFUND Targets 300, 000 Loan Applications in 2024:-** The Managing Director of the Nigerian Education Loan Fund (NELFUND), Akintunde Sawyerr, has announced that the NELFUND anticipates between 250,000 to 300,000 applications for the student loan scheme in the current year. During an interview with Channels TV in Abuja on Monday, Mr. Sawyerr noted that the number of applicants from the non-academic sector may be significantly lower, as this aspect of the scheme is newly introduced.

However, he assured that NELFUND has sufficient budgetary allocation to cater to all two million students enrolled in tertiary institutions across the country. The loan facility is available not only to prospective students but also to those already pursuing their studies in various public institutions.

Regarding loan recovery, Mr. Sawyerr

explained that the loan will be deducted directly from the applicants' earnings once they commence employment. He further stated that the scheme is insured to mitigate potential risks and exposures that may arise during the loan repayment process.

Additionally, the revised Student Loan Act provides for loan forgiveness in specific circumstances, such as the unfortunate demise of the borrower, rendering them unable to repay the loan.

**LEADERSHIP, WEDNESDAY, JULY 3, 2024: JAMB Okays Change of Institution, Course for DE Applicants:-** The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has opened the window for 2024 Direct Entry (DE) applicants to change their institution or course choice. The Board announced that the service is now available on its portal for interested applicants. This announcement was made through JAMB's official X handle, formerly Twitter, stating: "This is to inform 2024 DE applicants that wish to apply for a change of institution/course that the service is now available."

**LEADERSHIP, TUESDAY, JULY 2, 2024: JAMB Registration Now Mandatory for NOUN, Distance Learning Admission Seekers:-** The Joint Admissions and Matriculations Board (JAMB) has announced that prospective students seeking admission to the Nigerian Open University of Nigeria (NOUN) and other open distance learning centers must register through JAMB. This directive applies to all candidates, who are required to provide their unique National Identification Number (NIN) during registration.

According to JAMB, this measure aims to prevent fraudulent characters from compromising

candidates' records through dubious registration channels.

The advisory states: "In compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has made it mandatory for all applicants seeking admission to Nigerian tertiary institutions to provide their NIN during registration, regardless of the mode of study. This applies to both regular and non-regular programs, including NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time, and Sandwich programs. Prospective candidates in non-regular categories must create a profile code before registering with JAMB." Also in Punch, Tuesday, July 2, 2024.

NEWS AGENCY OF NIGERIA, WEDNESDAY, JULY 3, 2024: FG to address gender gap in technical education – Mamman:- The Federal Government has pledged to bridge the gender gap in the National Business and Technical Examinations. Minister of Education, Professor Tahir Mamman, made this announcement while monitoring examinations conducted by the National Business and Technical Examinations Board (NABTEB) in Abuja on July 3, 2024.

Professor Mamman revealed that the ministry is introducing skills programs in schools, spanning from basic to tertiary education levels. He emphasized that schools will be required to implement these programs, aimed at promoting female participation in technical courses.

The minister stated, "We have implemented various policies and measures to foster female participation in technical courses. Our ministry has programs in place to support female education, and we anticipate achieving parity soon."

He encouraged students to enrol in skills programs to address quality and employment issues, assuring that acquiring skills will prepare them for employment opportunities. The minister also announced that the challenge of funding university education has been resolved and urged students to take advantage of the government's newly introduced scholarship scheme to finance their education.

PUNCH, THURSDAY, JULY 4, 2024:

JAMB Uncovers 3, 000 Fake Graduates:- The Joint Admissions and Matriculations Board (JAMB) has uncovered 3,000 individuals who falsely claim to be graduates, despite never having attended a university. The Board's Registrar, Professor Ishaq Oloyede, revealed this in a recent report published in the Board's bulletin. He disclosed this information during a meeting with the leadership of the Committee of Pro-Chancellors of State Universities.

Professor Oloyede stated, "Due to pervasive corruption, some individuals have fraudulently obtained graduate status without ever setting foot in a university. We have documented over 3,000 such cases." He emphasized that illegal admissions by some institutions are a source of national embarrassment and disgrace.

In December 2023, the House of Representatives Committee on Basic Education directed JAMB to compile a list of tertiary institutions engaging in irregular and illegal admissions. JAMB had previously cautioned candidates against accepting admissions from such institutions without proper academic participation. The Board reiterated that all admission applications for first degrees, national diplomas, national innovation diplomas, and Nigeria certificates in education must be processed exclusively through JAMB, in a statement titled "Cessation of Illegal/Irregular Admission." Also in Vanguard, Thursday, July 4, 2024.

DAILY TRUST, THURSDAY, JULY 4, 2024: FG Inaugurates Governing Council Of Tertiary Institutions, Warns Against Interference:- The Federal Government has officially inaugurated the Governing Councils of tertiary institutions, tasked with ensuring the seamless operation of Nigerian Universities, Polytechnics, and Colleges of Education over the next four years. Minister of Education, Professor Tahir Mamman, inaugurated the Chairmen and members of the councils in Abuja on Thursday, 4 July 2024, acknowledging the challenging decision-making process that had spanned the past 10 months.

Professor Mamman congratulated the newly appointed council members and cautioned them against excessive interference in the human, financial, and resource management of the institutions. He emphasized the distinct roles of the Management and Governing Councils, stressing that councils should not intervene in the day-to-day management of the institutions.

Instead, the councils were urged to promote responsible unionism, address issues like cultism and drug abuse, and develop strategies to detect and eradicate social vices such as sexual harassment, theft, and extortion. The Pro-Chancellor of the University of Lagos, Chief Wole Olanipekun, speaking on behalf of the Governing Councils, encouraged Vice Chancellors to collaborate with the councils to improve the institutions, emphasizing the importance of building rather than dismantling.

The Executive Secretary of the National Universities Commission (NUC), Chris Maiyaki, extended his congratulations to the councils and assured them of his organization's full support, pledging to provide 100% backing to enhance the university system. Also in Vanguard, Thursday, July 4, 2024.

**E**ntrepreneurship education is the collection of formalised teachings that informs, trains and educates anyone interested in participating in the socioeconomic development of the society through any project that aims at promoting entrepreneurship awareness, business creation or small business development.

entrepreneurship studies developed as a follow-up to the declaration of the United Nations on Entrepreneurship in 2005 and its adoption by the Nigerian Government in 2006. The National University Commission (NUC), as a consequence, started a mandatory entrepreneurship development course for all undergraduates before graduation in 2007. This measure is to address the problem of graduate unemployment and strategically position the economy for sustainable development.

The philosophy underscoring the undergraduate B.Sc. entrepreneurship programme in Nigerian universities is to develop a

crop of broadly-educated entrepreneurial professionals. Through this programme, students are exposed to the most recent research and theory in international business, market research, promotion, advertising and many more. It also focuses on business opportunities exploitation, business plan development and control, start-up establishment, management, team-building, market strategies, human resource management, leadership, innovation, intellectual property, economy, networking, market research, among others.

A career in this field is lucrative on account of the upward trend in unemployment among graduates. To venture into entrepreneurship, business owners are trained on how to set up and manage start-ups (small or medium-scale enterprises). Graduates of entrepreneurial programmes can also work in private and government-owned establishments, industries, research institutions, academia, banks,

schools, etc. It is a four-year course under the Faculty of Administration in most of the nation's universities.

UTME subjects required include Use of English, Economics, Mathematics, and any of the trio of Accounts, Government or Geography. O' level requirements include a credit pass in English Language, Mathematics, Economics and any two Art or Social Science subjects. Universities that offer Entrepreneurship include Bayero University, Kano, University of Benin, Obafemi Awolowo University, among other federal, state and private universities. The professional body is the Institute of Professional Entrepreneurs and Strategic Administrators of Nigeria (IPESA-Nigeria) for the purpose of promoting standards and values of the profession in Nigeria.

### ...JAMB Delineates Zones for Trainings, Other Functions

Previously, staff were grouped into two zones (North and South) for large-scale events. However, the Board's management has opted for a more effective approach, dividing the country into Lagos and Kaduna zones.

The Lagos zone comprises offices in

the South-South, South-West, and South-East regions, excluding Port Harcourt and Benin, but including Kano and Abuja. The Kaduna zone covers offices in the North-central, North-west, and North-east regions, excluding Kano and Abuja, but including Port Harcourt and Benin.

This redistribution aims to eliminate geopolitical sentiments that have recently dominated national discussions, promoting a more unified and efficient approach to JAMB's operations.

### **MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES**

**This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.**

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.

## CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS

🌿 All applications of admissions to **First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc.**, must be processed **ONLY** through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

🌿 No Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.

🌿 Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.

🌿 The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

### ADVERTORIALS

🌿 Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.

🌿 It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
