...Cautions Against Frivolous Petition

The Independent Corrupt Practices & Other Related Offences Commission (ICPC) has reiterated the importance of whistleblowing as a necessary tool in the fight against corruption.

However, the anti-corruption body cautioned would-be whistleblowers to be sure of their facts even as it warns that frivolous petitions and false alarms or

unsubstantiated claims attract 10-year imprisonment and other sanctions.

The ICPC stated this at a sensitisation workshop on "Promoting Whistleblowing as an Ethical Responsibility in Organisations" organised by the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) Anti-corruption and Transparency

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2025 UTME ACCREDITATION: NO CENTRE WILL BE CONSIDERED AFTER DECEMBER 1, 2024

All centres are required to conduct their Autobot/Autotest between November 25 and December 1, 2024, in preparation for the subsequent physical visit from the accreditation team. Please note that no centre will be considered for accreditation after the deadline of December 1, 2024.

This notice is directed at both new and previously registered centres, which are urged to take immediate action.

The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) emphasizes that the Autobot/Autotest is mandatory. Only centres that successfully complete this test and meet the necessary criteria will qualify for a physical visit from the accreditation team. Eligible centres will receive notification regarding the date for the physical accreditation exercise scheduled for December 2024, following the completion of the Autobot/Autotest.

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IMO TO PARTNER JAMB FOR 2025 UTME

The Imo State Government is set to partner with the Joint Admissions and Matriculations Board (JAMB), Owerri Zonal Office, to launch a sensitization campaign to educate prospective candidates on the modalities for participating in the upcoming 2025 UTME registration and examination.

...Whistleblowing A Necessary Tool in Anti-Corruption War - ICPC

Unit (ACTU) held on 19th November, 2024, at the Board's auditorium, Bwari, Abuja.

In her presentation, the ICPC resource person, Mrs. Adogo Alonyenu, pointed out that if the nation is to change the poor narrative with respect to her unenviable anti-corruption record, then the whistleblowing policy should be given all the necessary impetus to work.

According to her, "The Whistleblowing Policy is in line with the zero tolerance policy of the federal government of Nigeria for any act of corruption within and outside the public service as the campaign is geared towards promoting accountability, transparency and promotion of ethnical standards.

Alonyenu, in her definition of whistleblowing describes it as an act of exposing corrupt practices to the public or concerned authorities with the hope of stopping it usually by an employee and usually often confidentially. She also described it as the act of raising concern about a wrongdoing within an organisation. She explained that the policy, in essence, encourages people to voluntarily disclose information about fraud, bribery, and any form of corruption or wrongdoing to appropriate authorities.

According to her, the objectives of the policy is to inculcate a culture of openness, accountability and integrity into the operational processes of organisations as well as serving as a deterrent against malpractices, infractions, irregularities or misconduct.

Furthermore, she also said the policy also provides a discrete and confidential channel for making reports or raising complaints against observed wrongdoing noting that reports made should be taken seriously, investigated and the outcome duly communicated with a view to ensuring potential whistleblowers are encouraged to report any wrongdoing devoid of fear of harassment, intimidation or victimisation.

In his remarks, the Registrar, commended the resource person for her beautiful delivery, stating that sometimes a perpetrator could be aware of his corrupt act but noted that at times, he could have acted out of ignorance. He, therefore, urged all to be above board in all their dealings and stated that whatever be the case, we would all give account to the Creator one day.

While urging all to steer clear of corruption as well as speak out when they see corrupt acts being perpetrated, he echoed the saying: "When you see something, say something."

Prof. Oloyede implored employers of labour to look inwards to ascertain the root cause of theft within their organisations. He noted that only thieves would go out of their way to steal and, as such, should be differentiated from "accidental thieves", who are victims of circumstances.

He stated that it is in order to curtail such opportunistic crimes that the Board had institutionalised some welfare packages to create lawful ways of meeting the needs of its employees such as enhanced allowances, the introduction of lunch for all staff of the Board as well as the implementation of robust medical support to ailing staff with medical emergencies especially in situation where their NHIS might not be adequate to offset such.

Additionally, he cited the enhanced and robust staff housing and the retirement package to tidy new retirees over the tough periods while waiting for their entitlements.

He said, "If an individual seeks lawful means to prosper, the Almighty Allah would make lawful means available to him."

Prof. Oloyede warned all against false accusation adding that the social media had not been helpful in that regard as slanderous messages are often circulated to malign people and in most cases such injurious information would be found to be untrue.

On the part of the Board, the Registrar stated that the JAMBulletin features full financial disclosures on a weekly basis for intense scrutiny and engagement by interested parties.

Earlier, the JAMB - ACTU Chairperson, Mrs. Pius Ville had expressed gratitude to the Registrar and his management team for their support to the Board's ACTU.

It is crucial to understand that any centre that does not achieve a satisfactory result on the Autobot/Autotest by the specified date will NOT be revisited. Only centres that meet the outlined requirements will be approved and listed by the Board for the 2025 Registration and UTME.

In preparation for the 2025 centre accreditation exercise, JAMB has issued a series of guidelines aimed at ensuring a smooth process. These guidelines reaffirm the Board's

commitment to conducting a successful examination.

All prospective Computer-Based Test Centres interested in participating in the accreditation exercise are encouraged to visit JAMB CBT Centre Requirements to familiarize themselves with the requirements for establishing a JAMB-approved CBT centre. Following this, new centres must notify the Board in writing of their readiness to participate in the 2025 UTME accreditation exercise.

New centres are also instructed to submit a formal application to the Registrar through the Zonal Director or State Coordinator in their respective states. This will enable the creation of accounts for them on the Centre Management System (CMS) Portal for registration.

Meanwhile, existing centres should proceed to register on the Centre Management System (CMS) Portal to formally express their interest in the accreditation exercise.

During an outreach event in Lagos on November 12, 2024, held at Akande Dahunsi Senior Secondary School and St. Gregory's College, students expressed their gratitude for the initiative, noting that it provided critical insights necessary for a successful registration for the 2025 UTME/DE, helping them avoid

common mistakes.

Similar outreach activities were conducted in the Federal Capital Territory (FCT) and Katsina State, targeting secondary school students in SS II and III. The focus was on educating them about common pitfalls during registration, data correction processes, and O'level result uploads.

In Taraba State, the JAMB team visited several schools, including Deeper Life Academy, Iqra Science Academy, Our Lady of Consolation, Federal Government Girls' College, Government Day Secondary School, and Government Science College, all located in Jalingo.

In Ebonyi State, the SERVICOM Desk Officer, Mr. Ogbonnaya Nelson, led a team that sensitized over 120 secondary school students at Government Technical College, Abakaliki, on November 12, 2024. The Principal, Rev. Fr. Ozogne, urged students to take the information seriously and to avoid examination malpractices, emphasizing that proper preparation prevents poor performance.

In Jigawa State, students were guided through the registration processes to ensure a seamless experience for the upcoming UTME. The outreach took place at Model International Secondary School and Dutse Capital Secondary School in Dutse Local Government Area,

where informative flyers were distributed to assist participants with registration and admission processes. Mr. Ibrahim Khalil, Head of SERVICOM, specifically encouraged female candidates to be cautious with ornamental substances like Henna, which could hinder biometric verification during registration.

In Kebbi State, the message of early preparation and proper registration procedures was conveyed at Government Day Secondary School, Gwadangaji, and Federal Staff School, Birnin Kebbi.

In Ondo State, SERVICOM Head Mrs. Mary Johnson-Maliki highlighted that the sensitization program aims to inform the public, particularly students, about the Board's reforms, innovations, and readiness for the upcoming UTME. Schools visited in Akure included Megan and Shield College, African Comprehensive High School, Parker International High School, Greater Heights Academy, and Eji-Oba High School.

Additionally, the SERVICOM Unit in Adamawa State organized a sensitization visit to five selected secondary schools on November 11, 2024, to educate prospective UTME candidates about the registration procedures and how to avoid mistakes that could impact their future. The schools visited included ABTI International Academy, F.C.E.

MANDATORY USE OF THE NATIONAL IDENTIFICATION NUMBER (NIN) FOR REGISTRATION WITH JAMB BY CANDIDATES APPLYING FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES

This Advisory is issued to all the concerned institutions, and candidates desirous of applying to study under the non-regular mode of study in tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.

RE: CONDONMENT OF ILLEGAL ADMISSIONS BY JAMB

This is a reminder regarding Circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I, dated July 31, 2024, which addressed the termination of the condonement process for illegal admissions without registration numbers. In that circular, the Board requested that institutions declare such candidates by August 31, 2024. This marked the first phase of the exercise, and a subsequent deadline for registration and completion of the condonement process will be announced.

2. The second phase of the exercise, which pertains to the condonement of illegal admissions for candidates with registration numbers has now commenced. The Board has the necessary details and records for these candidates from earlier registrations.

3. By this development, **institutions are hereby required to now (or never) disclose, through the CAPS mail:**

- i. All candidates who were admitted illegally before 2017, that have JAMB registration numbers and whose records are on their system, within the next one (1) month beginning from 1st of September 2024.
- ii. All candidates who fall within the 2017-2020 window for the Condonment of Undisclosed Illegal Institutional Admissions (CUIIA) that have JAMB registration numbers and had not been included in the earlier declaration made by the institution. This is to be done within the next one (1) month beginning from 1st of September 2024.

4. The dateline for all these disclosures will be 30th of September 2024 after which no declaration will be entertained.

5. The Board would like to emphasize that any admissions granted during the specified periods (pre-2017 and 2017-2020) will no longer be recognized or condoned unless disclosed within this one-month window. Only students listed in the declared submissions will be permitted to register with the Board. A deadline for the completion of all condonement processes will be established.

6. These measures are implemented to address previously abused admission windows while reaffirming that CAPS remains the sole authorized platform for admissions. Institutions are strongly advised to adhere to these guidelines.

MINISTERIAL DIRECTIVES ON THE RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE INTER-MINISTERIAL INVESTIGATIVE COMMITTEE ON DEGREE CERTIFICATE MILLING: REQUEST FOR IMPLEMENTATION

You are aware that the Federal Government through an inter-ministerial committee had investigated the issues of certificate racketeering involving some foreign institutions around Nigeria. The investigations also looked at the issue of illegal admissions by institutions in Nigeria and the issuance of fake certificates by the institutions. The Hon. Minister of Education has now directed the implementation of the recommendations contained in the report of the investigation committee.

2. I therefore convey the directives of the Honourable Minister to the Board for implementation of the following recommendations (a copy of the letter from the Hon. Minister is attached):

- i. Enforce the mandatory requirement for all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to exclusively conduct their admissions processes through the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS) under the auspices of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
- ii. Mandate all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to regularly submit their matriculation lists to the Federal Ministry of Education not later than three months after matriculation ceremonies through the dedicated channel of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

3. Consequently, the Board reiterates the Policy that under no condition shall any candidate be admitted outside CAPS. Furthermore, the recent circular No. JAMB/ADMS/DO/192/V.I dated 31st July 2024 by the Board, emphasizes that no illegal admission will henceforth be condoned and any institution found to have admitted any candidate outside CAPS will be made to face appropriate sanctions. This is in addition to the forfeiture of the said admission with its legal implications.

4. Each Institution is expected to promptly respond to JAMB analysis of its matriculation list so that the list and the responses could be forwarded, as directed, to the Honourable Minister of Education.
5. To further discuss this matter, the Board is arranging a virtual meeting involving all the institutions and the officials of JAMB. The details will be communicated to you.

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

2. The Committee has submitted its Report and the Honourable Minister of Education has approved its recommendations for implementation.
3. In that regard, I hereby convey the request of the Honourable Minister for the implementation of the following recommendations of the Committee:
 - i. Enforce the mandatory requirement for all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to exclusively conduct their admissions processes through the Central Admissions Processing System (CAPS) under the auspices of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
 - ii. Mandate all tertiary institutions in Nigeria to regularly submit their matriculation lists to the Federal Ministry of Education not later than three months after matriculation ceremonies through the dedicated channel of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).
4. You are kindly requested to implement the above recommendations and furnish the Ministry with implementation updates.

ADMISSION OF CANDIDATES WITH MINIMUM ADMISSIBLE AGE OF 16 YEARS

Recall that the issue of the minimum age for admission in the nation's tertiary institutions was deliberated and decided at the 2024 Policy Meeting to be 16 years old for the 2024/25 academic session. Subsequently, the cut-off date was put on the 31st of December 2024.

2. The Board has taken cognizance that, due to different reasons, some institutions expect the 2024/2025 admission to run through July 2025. Without compromising the standard or infringing on the individual institution's admission policy, the Board has now decided to allow any willing institution to admit candidates who will be 16 years old by the 31st of August 2025, so long as the standards set by the institution qualify such candidate but couldn't be admitted only because of age.

3. This is without prejudice to the decision of any institution that might have on its own, decided on the minimum age of not less than 16 years which remains sacrosanct.

4. By this development, you are requested to harvest from your CAPS and send the list of candidates who would be 16 years of age between 1st of January and 31st of August 2025 who are eligible for admission (if any), not later than a week from the date on this letter to enable final decision.

NOTE:

- i. This effort is to ensure equity because those whose 2024 admission would last till August 2025 would not be unduly favoured.
- ii. Any institution that insists on its 16 years being within the year 2024 is completely free to do so.

In response, Mr. Vincent Okuku, the Proprietor of Evinok Connection, expressed gratitude to the Board for its ongoing support. He thanked the Director for the timely updates and advice, assuring her that centre owners would adhere to all rules and regulations set forth by the Board.

JAMB OFFICE EKITI STATE WELCOMES NEW COORDINATOR

In a related development, Mr. Fasasi Ademuyiwa, team leader of the Nigeria Security and Civil Defense

Corps (NSCDC) at the Ekiti State Office, pledged his team's commitment to safeguarding the lives and property of the Board.

Additionally, on Wednesday, November 20, 2024, Mr. Dada and his team paid a courtesy visit to the Federal Mortgage Bank of Nigeria (FMBN) in Ekiti State. They were welcomed by the FMBN State Director, Mr. Balogun Saeed, who acknowledged the importance of maintaining a strong relationship between the bank and the Board. Mr. Dada highlighted the necessity of inter-agency collaboration to fulfill the Board's mandate and expressed a desire to strengthen this partnership.

JICCS HOLDS ORDINARY GENERAL MEETING

To commemorate the end of the 2024 accounting year, the JAMB Investment and Credit Cooperative Society (JICCS) convened its Ordinary General Meeting on Thursday, November 19, 2024, utilizing both physical and virtual platforms.

During the meeting, the Society's President, Mr. Caleb Maigari, expressed his gratitude to members for their cooperation and support throughout the year. He highlighted the numerous achievements of the Society over the years but emphasized the necessity of addressing certain pressing concerns.

One significant issue raised was the overwhelming demand from members for access to 70% of their contributions prior to retirement, enabling them to establish businesses before fully disengaging from service.

Additionally, the President addressed the situation regarding the Prof. Dibu Ojerinde Phase 1 Estate, where approximately eight

members were unable to take possession of their units due to a limited number of available houses. He noted that the current economic conditions would not support the proposals made by the congress regarding housing costs. To resolve this, he suggested that affected members consider accepting vacant plots of land to build their homes, a proposal that was subsequently adopted by the congress.

The meeting also discussed the issue of minimum monthly savings, which the Society's bylaws set at N5,000. However, records indicated that over 190 members were contributing only N1,000, which hindered the loan disbursement process. As a result, total member contributions had decreased to approximately N35 million. After thorough discussions, the congress unanimously agreed to inform members in writing of the need to raise their minimum monthly contributions to N5,000 as soon as possible.

Regarding the management of the

newly commissioned Prof. Salim Multi-purpose Complex, the President urged members to recommend individuals of proven integrity for its management.

The topic of long, short, and emergency loans was also raised, particularly concerning the declining contributions from members and its impact on loan eligibility.

Consequently, the congress resolved to shorten the duration of long-term loans from 36 months to 24 months, with an interest rate of 10% applied to both long and short-term loans, in accordance with directives from the national body.

Lastly, the introduction of an insurance company, Tangerine Life, was discussed. Representatives from the firm were present to educate members on how they could meet their financial needs through various offerings, including their Savings Plus, Education, and Family Welfare Plans, among others.

TULIP COLLEGE VISITS JAMB

The authorities of Tulip College, Kano, recently paid a courtesy visit to the Zonal office of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Kano.

The visit was to mark the Silver Jubilee of the College's existence in Kano.

The two-man delegation comprised: Dr. AbdulSalam Dursun

and Mallam Dauda Muhammad, who are in charge of both the Boys' and Girls' sections respectively.

The Head of the team, Dr. Abdul Salam, in his remarks, said the purpose of the visit was to cement the existing cordial relationship between the College and Board. He added that as good partners, it is the desire of the institution to work

together in order to promote synergy and understanding between the school and JAMB.

In his opening remarks, the Acting Zonal Director Salim Kabir Galadanci, said he was happy to receive them noting that the school was the first secondary school ever to visit the State Office under his watch.

CESSATION OF ILLEGAL/IRREGULAR ADMISSIONS


 All applications of admissions to **First Degree, National Diploma, National Innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education into Full-Time, Distance Learning, Part-Time, Outreach, Sandwich, etc.**, must be processed **ONLY** through the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB).

Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.

 The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

ADVERTORIALS

 Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.

 It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes listed above.
