The 2024 Policy Meeting has approved the admission guidelines for 2024, setting the minimum admission scores as follows:

140 for universities,
100 for polytechnics,
monotechnics, and innovative enterprise institutions (IEIs),
and

100 for colleges of education.
These scores are the minimum tolerable (thresholds) for consideration of candidates for admission to the various tiers of tertiary institutions in Nigeria.

JAMB NOT RESPONSIBLE FOR FIXING MINIMUM TOLERABLE ADMISSION MARKS - OLOYEDE

The Registrar of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, has explained that the Board

does not fix the so-called 'cut-off mark', which should, at any rate, be rightly referred to as the "minimum tolerable admission score", as it is being insinuated in some quarters.

The Registrar said the explanation became necessary to correct the erroneous impression that minimum tolerable admission scores for respective institutions were decided by JAMB saying it is the responsibility of the tertiary institutions themselves to decide their respective institutional minimum tolerable admission score. He further stated that what was arrived at policy meetings were benchmark national minimum tolerable admission scores for admission into the nation's tertiary institutions. This score, according to him, is the minimum score a candidate, who

SERIOUS SANCTIONS AWAITS INSTITUTION SELLING IN-HOUSE APPLICATION FORMS

The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has warned institutions selling in-house application forms to desist from the practice to avoid the sledgehammer of the federal government.

The Board reminded all tertiary institutions in the country that all applications for admissions to regular and non-regular first Degree, National

Diploma/National innovation Diploma and the Nigeria Certificate in Education must be processed through JAMB and with the use of Central Admissions Processing System(CAPS).

The Board further warned institutions that rather than selling unauthorised forms, they are expected to advise candidates to apply directly to the

PROFILE CREATION MANDATORY FOR NON-REGULAR PROGRAMMES - JAMB

The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has said it is compulsory for all prospective candidates seeking admissions into non-regular programmes to generate a profile code using their National Identification Number (NIN) as done by candidates for regular programmes.

The non-regular programmes are Part-

time, Sandwich, Open University and Distance Learning.

Also, the Board has directed that generation of profile codes for these categories of candidates is now mandatory before registration with JAMB.

Furthermore, in order to address the issue of flexible period of application, the Board would ensure that its online

sat the Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME), is required to attain for the purpose of admission into Nigerian tertiary institutions noting that what JAMB does is to simply escalate same to the public and ensure that the institution does not go lower than that.

Furthermore, he said the minimum tolerable score is a pruning mechanism to peg application limits to manageable size through which candidates compete for available spaces in the nation's tertiary institutions.

In the same vein, he stated that it is erroneous for parents or candidates to make claims of meeting the minimum tolerable score and as such should be given automatic

admission adding that the minimum score was just a benchmark and not for automatic placement of candidates for admission as there are other variables and parameters to be considered.

It is to be recalled that participants at the 2024 Policy Meeting on Admission had approved the National Minimum Tolerable UTME Score (NTMUS), for the 2024 Admission into the nation's higher institutions as 140 for universities while 100 was approved for polytechnics and colleges of education and innovative enterprises institutions.

Earlier, the Registrar had explained that the institutions, which proposed lower minimum tolerable scores,

would have to increase their benchmarks to the agreed minimum tolerable points. He, however, added that institutions have the liberty to peg the institutional tolerable score above the agreed minimum points.

It is also worthy of note that Pan-Atlantic University, Ibeju-Lekki, Lagos, had pegged its minimum admissible score at 220 while some other universities fixed theirs at 200. However, by implication of the approved minimum tolerable scores of 140 and 100, no institution could go below these approved scores as indicated for their category.

ADEBOWALE LAUDS OLOYEDE'S COMMITMENT TO NATION BUILDING

A call has gone to the Registrar, Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB), Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, not to relent in his efforts to revamp the fortunes of the nation's education sector through his landmark innovations.

This commendation was made recently in an exclusive interview by a university don, Prof. Kayode Adebawale, Vice-Chancellor, University of Ibadan, in an exclusive interview with JAMB Bulletin in Ibadan. He pointed out that chief among

these innovations is the institutionalisation of the Central Admission Processing System (CAPS), which was aimed at reducing human interference in the admission process. This, according to him, has ensured the fairness and integrity of the admission process. While admitting that no system, innovation or policy is foolproof, Prof. Adebawale stated that the introduction of the CAPS platform has largely improved the quality of intakes into the nation's tertiary institutions.

Furthermore, he noted that the Board's admission process has ensured that every candidate irrespective of status received fair treatment. He added that it was this prioritisation of equity and equality that has endeared JAMB to so many Nigerians.

Prof. Adebawale described his first-hand experience of the 2024 UTME exercise as the Oyo State's Chief External Examiner for the Board, also highlighted the vital place of JAMB's standardized e-testing process

Board. To curb the menace, the Board has indicated its synergy with relevant regulatory agencies such as the National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and the National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) to put a stop to the unwholesome practice. It warned that any infringement to the rule would be reported to the Honourable Minister of Education by

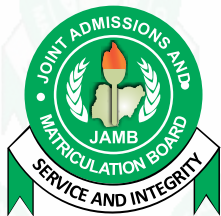
the Board for necessary action.

The Board also reminded institutions that the duration of their non-regular studies must be maintained as approved by the regulatory agencies, which must not be less than 150 percentage of that of regular programmes.

The Board also urged institutions that desire to place advertisements to do so with a proviso to candidates, who applied for the current 2024

UTME/DE, to change to their institution as (first choice 1st) rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application forms or apply to them directly.

In the same vein, institutions are urged to note that the advisory on advertisement is to prevent infractions and to preclude institutions from running foul of extent provisions concerning double applications.

PUNCH, SUNDAY, JULY 22, 2024: NBTE to Stop Physical Accreditation of Institutions in August: The National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) has successfully transitioned to a digital platform for all quality assurance processes, aligning with the Federal Government's digital-driven policies and the requirements of the Fourth Industrial Revolution. As of August 2024, physical accreditation and other quality assurance activities will no longer be conducted in institutions under its purview.

The NBTE, the apex regulatory body for technical education in Nigeria, has recorded notable achievements in its digitalization efforts. As the overseer of educational programmes at secondary, polytechnic, and monotechnic levels, the NBTE has successfully implemented its digitalization policy, with a total of 489 institutions and stakeholders currently utilizing the digital platform. This milestone marks a significant step forward in the NBTE's mission to enhance the quality and efficiency of technical education in Nigeria through digital transformation.

According to a statement issued by the Head of Media Unit, Fatima Abubakar, in Kaduna on Sunday, the board has completed digital

assessments and documentation processes for 17 institutions across the six geopolitical zones, with approvals granted accordingly. Furthermore, digital monitoring has been introduced to ensure strict adherence to established standards. The NBTE's digitalization drive, led by Executive Secretary Prof. Idris Bugaje, aims to deliver more efficient, effective, and transparent quality assurance processes, ensuring cost-effectiveness and integrity.

PUNCH, MONDAY, JULY 22, 2024: 2024 UTME Result Slips Available for Printing - JAMB: The Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) has announced that the result slips for the 2024 Unified Tertiary Matriculation Examination (UTME) are now available for printing. According to a statement issued by Dr. Fabian Benjamin, Public Communications Advisor, the result slips feature advanced security features and candidates' photographs.

Candidates can print their result slips from approved Computer-Based Test (CBT) centres starting from Monday, 22 July 2024. Please note that result slips cannot be printed from cybercafes or other internet-

enabled platforms.

Dr Benjamin advised candidates to utilize only approved channels for printing their result slips "to avoid falling prey to fraudulent activities, such as attempted score inflation, perpetrated by individuals seeking to exploit this process." Also in Premium Times, Monday, July 22, 2024.

PUNCH, WEDNESDAY, JULY 24, 2024: WAEC Officials Detained for Challenging Reps Probe: On Tuesday, July 22, 2024, four officials of the West African Examination Council (WAEC) were arrested by the Nigeria Police Force, acting on the orders of the House of Representatives Committee on Basic Examination Bodies. The arrested officials were: Amos Dangut, Head of National Office, WAEC Nigeria, representing the Registrar; Angus Okeleze, Senior Deputy Registrar; Victor Odu, acting Director of Finance; and Segun Jerumeh, Deputy Director of Finance.

The arrests followed a motion moved by committee member Uchenna Okonkwo after the officials failed to provide satisfactory responses to the panel's enquiries during an investigative hearing. The WAEC officials had engaged in a

disagreement with the lawmakers, with Dangut asserting that the examination body was not a government agency and therefore not accountable to parliament. However, the lawmakers maintained that WAEC Nigeria, being a creation of an Act of the National Assembly, was indeed accountable to parliament as representatives of the people.

Okonkwo's motion, seconded by Marie Ebikake, called for the officials to be taken into custody pending further investigation. Committee Chairman Oforji Oboku directed the officials to present audited statements of accounts from 2018 to 2024 at a later date, as well as relevant documents related to the N5 billion loan obtained by WAEC in 2022 for the purchase of customized calculators, among other expenditures.

PUNCH, WEDNESDAY, JULY 24, 2024: Council Mobilises Kano Students for FG Loan: The Kano State All Progressives Congress Students

Council organized a media briefing to educate and raise awareness among students of higher institutions in the state about the significance of the Nigerian Education Loan Fund (NELFUND) and the process of accessing the loan. The briefing, held at the Nigeria Union of Journalists Press Centre, marked the initial step by the council to sensitize students on the loan and application process.

The Director General of the council, Yahaya Usman, commended President Bola Tinubu's administration for initiating the loan program aimed at supporting students in achieving their goals. The council's Director of Finance, Najmuddin Mukhtar, stated that the loan application process targets students from all 44 Local Government Areas of the state.

Nigerian Education Loan Fund, NELFUND, has successfully onboarded 16 additional state-owned tertiary institutions to its student loan scheme, bringing the total number of registered institutions to 86. This update was announced by the fund on its official social media handle, @NELFUND, on Thursday, July 25, 2024.

This expansion enhances the reach and impact of our student loan programme."

It added, "We urge institutions that have not yet submitted their complete and accurate student data to do so promptly, enabling their students to benefit from the programme."

This initiative, a flagship programme of President Bola Tinubu's administration, is expected to benefit over 1.2 million students. The President approved N35 billion for the scheme's launch, following the signing of the enabling law on April 3, 2024.

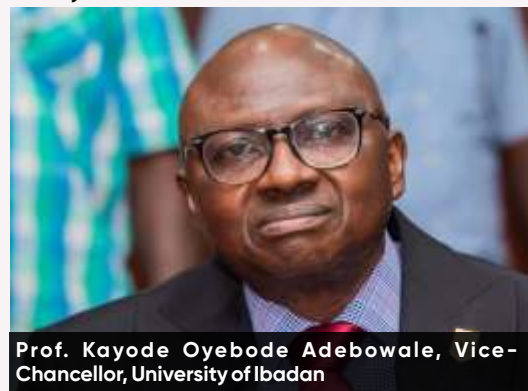
which, he noted had ensured that only suitable centres are accredited for the Board's examinations.

BRITISH COUNCIL ALLAYS FEARS ON INTEGRITY OF INSTITUTIONAL STANDARD

The British Council has allayed the fears of the Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) with respect to the sanctity of its processes, quality assurance and integrity of its Cambridge A/L examination.

The Director of Programmes, Mr. Chikodi Onyemereka, who led a five-man delegation of the Council to the Board's National Headquarters, Abuja, assured the Board that all Cambridge international

examinations are always conducted in compliance with high ethical standards.

The Director disclosed that the Council's "four buckets of school exams compliance and integrity" comprises school quality criteria and inspection, quality standards, secure storage, invigilation and training coupled with business assurance inspection, spot-checks reviews, post-test quality checks and security management, adding that all these

criteria are replicated across all Cambridge partners and associate schools.

The delegation promised to look at the concerns raised by JAMB with a view to improving on their services, blocking any gaps, enhance examination security and administration while aligning with international best practices and standards.

Earlier, the Registrar, Prof. Is-haq Oloyede, stressed the need to

maintain standards and uphold the integrity of the examination without compromising standards stating that anything short of this would not be accepted.

He pointed out that the Board was not under any obligation to accept any certification as it was being governed by rules adding that the same was also applicable to IJMB, JUPEB and other A'level examinations.

The Registrar also pointed out that there were reports of infractions and complaints on the certificate offered by the body, registration, duration of programmes, appointment of

invigilators, monitoring, training of officials and its plethora of candidates, who do not have O'level taking A'level examinations, among others.

He urged the Council to furnish JAMB with its time table on its registration of candidates, duration of programme, appointment of invigilators, teachers, as well as its means of identification of candidates even as he enjoined the Council to look at the issue of private candidates, among other concerns.

The Registrar also stressed the need for the Council to incorporate NIN as a unique identifier in its registration

process.

ENTREPRENEURSHIP

Entrepreneurship education is the collection of formalised teachings that informs, trains and educates anyone interested in participating in the socioeconomic development of the society through any project that aims at promoting entrepreneurship awareness, business creation or small business development.

entrepreneurship studies developed as a follow-up to the declaration of the United Nations on Entrepreneurship in 2005 and its adoption by the Nigerian Government in 2006. The National University Commission (NUC), as a consequence, started a mandatory entrepreneurship development course for all undergraduates before graduation in 2007. This measure is to address the problem of graduate unemployment and strategically position the economy for sustainable development.

The philosophy underscoring the undergraduate B.Sc. entrepreneurship programme in

Nigerian universities is to develop a crop of broadly-educated entrepreneurial professionals. Through this programme, students are exposed to the most recent research and theory in international business, market research, promotion, advertising and many more. It also focuses on business opportunities exploitation, business plan development and control, start-up establishment, management, team-building, market strategies, human resource management, leadership, innovation, intellectual property, economy, networking, market research, among others.

A career in this field is lucrative on account of the upward trend in unemployment among graduates. To venture into entrepreneurship, business owners are trained on how to set up and manage start-ups (small or medium-scale enterprises). Graduates of entrepreneurial programmes can also work in private and government-owned

establishments, industries, research institutions, academia, banks, schools, etc. It is a four-year course under the Faculty of Administration in most of the nation's universities.

UTME subjects required include Use of English, Economics, Mathematics, and any of the trio of Accounts, Government or Geography. O' level requirements include a credit pass in English Language, Mathematics, Economics and any two Art or Social Science subjects. For special waivers from institutions, check the brochure at www.ibass.jamb.gov.ng. Universities that offer Entrepreneurship include Bayero University, Kano, University of Benin, Obafemi Awolowo University, among other federal, state and private universities. The professional body is the Institute of Professional Entrepreneurs and Strategic Administrators of Nigeria (IPESA-Nigeria) for the purpose of promoting standards and values of the profession in Nigeria.

The Board also announced that candidates for distance learning, part-time and other related mode of study, would apply through JAMB

before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their JAMB Registration Number. As such, application forms completed at the institutions should be changed to Part-time/Distance Learning

processing forms to avoid confusion. The Board stated that the policy directive is without prejudice to the processing fees being charged by respective tertiary institutions for their part-time programmes.

As part of measures to checkmate the nefarious activities of fraudulent characters, who are scheming to compromise candidates' records through dubious registration channels and in compliance with its enabling act, JAMB has mandated that all applicants desirous of studying in Nigerian tertiary institutions must provide their NIN while registering for any programme of study in any tertiary institution in Nigeria irrespective of whether the mode of study is **regular and non-regular**.

2. Consequently, it has now become mandatory for all prospective candidates in the **non-regular category (NOUN, Distance Learning, Part-time and Sandwich programmes)** to create a profile code, before registering with JAMB, by sending their NIN, through their unique phone number to either of the Board's sort code (55019 or 66019).
3. Immediately after the creation of profile, each candidate will proceed to a CBT Centre for registration. After the registration, the candidate's details will appear on the CAPS of the institution of choice under non-regular admission. The institution will then propose and recommend to the Board for approval and the candidate will accept and print admission letter.
4. Furthermore, all previous candidates in the non-regular programmes, who had not integrated their NIN or unique phone number on the Board's platform, would have to create a profile using their respective NINs to access any of the services of the Board.
5. No candidate can use the process to change any of the data already supplied to the Board.
6. JAMB, as a responsive organisation that is conscious of the peculiarities of the non-regular studies, will continue to make the registration process as flexible as possible by making its platform available throughout the year. It is, therefore, expected that candidates, who fall under this category, will apply through JAMB before approaching their preferred institutions to process their admission with their respective JAMB registration numbers. They would also be expected to pay their preferred institution a processing fee as determined by the respective institutions.

 Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB) and the three (3) Regulatory Agencies (National Universities Commission (NUC), National Board for Technical Education (NBTE) and National Commission for Colleges of Education (NCCE) will ensure that all Tertiary Institutions comply with this policy directive. Other Professional Regulatory Agencies will also play a role in sanitizing the process.

 The duration of all Non-Full Time Studies must be maintained as approved by the Regulatory Agencies. This is generally not less than one hundred and fifty percent (150%) of the equivalence of Full Time.

 Institutions that desire to place advertisement can do so with the requirement that candidates who sat for the current **UTME** (or **DE** candidates) should change to their institutions as First (1st) Choice rather than requesting the candidates to purchase another application form or apply. This is to prevent the issue of double registration which is a violation of the mandate of JAMB.

 It should be reiterated that no Institution should advertise or sell “application forms” for admissions into the programmes listed above. Institutions should advise candidates to apply to them through Joint Admissions and Matriculation Board (JAMB). Duplication of application forms is **NOT** allowed.
